Kia ora koutou.

The students have settled in well to their programmes of learning and everyone is happy and working hard.

The refurbished classrooms at the bottom of A Block are being enjoyed and next Monday our refurbished Art and DVC block will open. I would like to thank Adam Cels from Te Huruhi Primary School for allowing some of our classes to be roomed in Te Huruhi while we have been waiting for the Art block to be completed. The refurbishment of classrooms programme is to be ongoing throughout 2019 and plans have been drawn up for a new Food Technology room, Canteen, Science Laboratory and outdoor seating and covered area.

Timetabling is always an organic process at this time of the year. Students in the Senior school make option selections which means that we have to shift staff around because of their expertise. As part of this shifting timetable, 9M will swap their PE/Health teacher with their Mathematics teacher. Mrs Richeaux, who has come to us from St Mary's as a Mathematics teacher, will now take 9M Mathematics and Mr McTaggert will now be teaching PE/Health with 9M.

Congratulations to Mr Carroll who has won a fellowship from the Margaret and John Kalman Trust. Five Mathematics teachers from the Auckland region, including Mr Carroll will investigate how technology can be exploited for the benefit of Mathematics teaching and learning.

We are currently awaiting our finalized results from 2018 and I will publish them in the next couple of weeks. The Ministry of Education is now reporting results in a different format. Schools have published results for NCEA on a participation based figure. This means that only students who undertake a full time programme of NCEA will count in the statistics. Now, the Ministry is stating that it will be a roll based statistic. This will mean that all students, whether they are in a full time NCEA course or not, will be reported on. The reaction to the announcement of this new proposal is tough. When we have students who are in our school who are doing a part course at Levels 1, 2 and 3 who are successful at doing an individualized, personalized learning programme, they would not be seen as successful through MoE statistics but we know that a part time programme is the most successful way for those students to progress.

We are holding a meet and greet at Waiheke High School next Monday and we look forward to seeing you there.

Parents/Caregivers,

As you are all well aware summer is well and truly here. The current burn time in Auckland is around 15 minutes for exposed skin. We really want our students to protect themselves from the sun's harmful UV rays.

Hats During PE - Term 1, 2019



Students may wear any hat of their choice during PE, Health, Sport and Sea Sports lessons outside. This includes any style, colour, size, shape! The purpose of this hat is for sun protection. Students may ONLY wear this hat during PE, Sport, Health and Sea Sports lessons. They may not wear it during school time.

If students wish to wear a hat at lunch/interval/to/from school, they must wear a Waiheke High School navy blue cap, available from the uniform shop, or a navy blue hat of their own (no emblems please).

During PE, students should only wear a hat when it is sunny and the class is outside. This is likely to be mainly in Terms1 and 4. Hats are not permitted in the recreation centre or in classroom based PE, Health or Sea Sports lessons.

PE Staff are encouraged to actively promote and encourage the use of hats, including role modelling good practice

The hat rule is not compulsory, and therefore the choice rests ultimately with parents and students.

Cell Phone at School!



Most students have cellphones and they are welcome to bring these to school. However cellphones are to be switched off and in students' bags before coming into classes.

Year 7 Immunisation Available at School in May 2019

There are many Year 7 students that are due to have their 'Boostrix' vaccination. This is one injection that covers Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus, date of injection to be confirmed.

In May there will be a Boostrix education session at school, a Video will be shown and students will be given consent forms to take home to families. We shall also email a scanned version of these consent forms to families as students sometimes loose the forms. You can either print the relevant pages (5 and 7) or use the hard copy provided. **Completed forms to be returned to the school office by date to be confirmed**.

On Tuesday 26th June, we will be giving the Boostrix injections at the High School to those students that have requested it and have handed in a completed consent form. Further information in regards to Boostrix:

The 'Boostrix' vaccination is one injection that covers Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus:

Diphtheria

Diphtheria affects the throat, making it hard to breathe and swallow. It may also affect the nerves, muscles, heart and skin.

Whooping cough (pertussis)

This disease can damage the breathing tubes. Affected children may vomit and find it difficult to breathe when they cough.

Tetanus

Tetanus is a disease that can enter the body through a cut or a graze. It causes muscles to stiffen and spasm. It may affect the breathing muscles.

We believe many of the Year 7 students will have had their original Boostrix vaccination when they were a baby and at 4 years old. This is just a booster that is due at this age. It boosts their protection against the three diseases. If you want your child to be up to date with their immunisations, then this is an opportunity to get it done at school. Immunise against HPV for Boys and Girls aged 9-14 years.



Human Papillomavirus (HPV) immunisation helps protect against a virus that causes several cancers affecting both men and women. The HPV vaccine is available free for everyone 9-26 years.

The vaccine is recommended to be given to children aged 11-12 years, but it's free for those aged 9-26 years. The vaccine is now available for boys as well as girls

Those aged 9-14 years need two doses of the vaccine, at six months apart.

Those aged 15 years and older need three doses of the vaccine, spaced over six months.

Waiheke Health Trust nurses will be providing this free service to students in the School. The <u>first HPV vaccine</u> <u>is schedule to be given in March 2018, date to be confirmed.</u> There will be an information session and consent forms will be in early March.

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Who is this factsheet for?

Students, parents and whānau, people considering teaching in New Zealand, and employers.

National Certificates of Educational Achievement (NCEA)

National Certificates of Educational Achievement (NCEA) were introduced between 2002 and 2004 and they are the main secondary school qualifications in Aotearoa New Zealand. Every year, around 120,000 students gain an NCEA qualification.

NCEA is:

- three separate qualifications NCEA Level 1, 2 and 3. Students usually begin studying for NCEA Level 1 in Year 11 and continue through Years 12 and 13 (from ages 15 through to 18). NCEA enables students to prepare for the full range of pathways that lead to further study, training and employment. NCEA Level 2 recognised as the key foundation level qualification.
- a flexible qualification designed to recognise student achievement across a wide range of contexts and for a wide range of purposes. NCEA challenges all students, including the most able and highly motivated. NCEA also provides schools and kura the flexibility to develop a range of courses and programmes to suit the needs of their students.

- based on assessment standards that each have a defined credit value. Assessment standards describe what students must know or do to achieve credits. Standards are used to assess different areas of knowledge and skills at the three levels of NCEA.
- a qualification listed on the New Zealand Qualifications Framework. As with all listed qualifications, it is regularly reviewed.

It is important that students select their courses and standards carefully, so that their NCEA qualification supports them in their preferred future pathways. The Vocational Pathways and the University Entrance requirements – available on our website – provide helpful information about the skills and knowledge that employers, universities and other tertiary education organisations are looking for.

The education system and NCEA

The Aotearoa New Zealand education system is an internationally acknowledged high performing system. The New Zealand Curriculum and Te Marautanga o Aotearoa are together recognised as a broad and enabling framework. NCEA recognises achievement in both curricula, and together they are the key elements of Aotearoa New Zealand's student-centred education system. The curricula equip schools to provide for the diverse needs of learners and enable students to gain qualifications that prepare them for a full range of learning pathways and employment beyond school.





Assessment standards and NCEA

There are two types of assessment standards in NCEA - achievement standards and unit standards. The Ministry of Education develops the achievement standards, which are based on the achievement objectives of the New Zealand Curriculum and Te Marautanga o Aotearoa. Achievement standards can be assessed internally (by the school) or externally (by NZQA).

Industry Training Organisations and NZQA develop the unit standards. Unit standards are competency based - they recognise capability and competencies in real or realistic settings in mainly vocational areas of learning. All unit standards are internally assessed.

Credits and NCEA

The NCEA qualifications are based on credits. Every standard has a defined credit value; one credit represents approximately 10 hours of teaching, learning and assessment. This includes teaching time, homework and assessment time.

Students need a total of 80 credits for each NCEA qualification:

- NCEA Level 1 80 credits at any Level, including 10 credits in literacy and 10 credits in numeracy.
- NCEA Level 2 60 credits at Level 2 or above, plus 20 credits from Level 1 or above (the Level 1 literacy and numeracy requirements must also be met).
- NCEA Level 3 60 credits at Level 3 or above, plus 20 credits from Level 2 or above (the Level 1 literacy and numeracy requirements must also be met).
