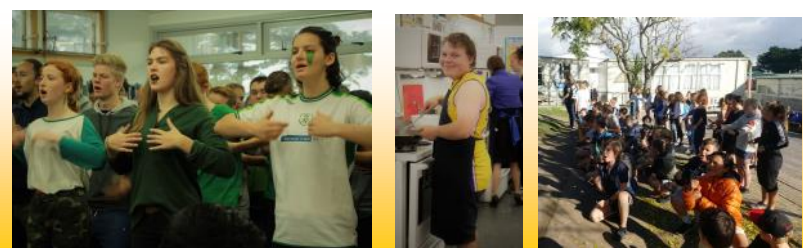


July **Waiheke High School**

Kia ora,

This term has been one of the busiest that the school has had for a while.

Towards the beginning of the term the school discovered e-coli through routine water testing. After a huge amount of investigation and a lot of speculation as to how and why we got e-coli, no real conclusions have been drawn. The good thing is that the school is now testing clear and the Ministry of Education has been supportive by spending a lot of time re-engineering bores, water flow and water storage. By the end of the holidays Waiheke High School should have a new bore, tank farm and piping infrastructures.

The design for the partial rebuild is on track as well. The ten teaching space block is a mixture of an open plan teaching and learning space that can be reconfigured for a more intimate learning space if necessary.

We have had some changes in staffing. Alison Bowden has now shifted off island to teach Maths in a position with the Auckland Regional Health Board. We have appreciated her hard work in this Faculty and we wish her well in her new position.

Suzanne Lee, our Deputy Principal, has retired and the school has farewelled her. Suzanne has been an integral part of the Senior Lead Team and she has been in our school for ten years. Suzanne will be a friend to the school and we look forward to welcoming her back into the school in this capacity. Currently we are advertising for a Deputy Principal and we have appointed a new Mathematics Teacher, Dr Michael Moroney, who will take up his Mathematics teaching position next term.

During the term, we had critical career conversations with our students. Some parents suggested that these conversations would be best at the Year 12 and 13 level. We are keen that all senior students be involved with these conversations and this includes Year 11 students because students who have a career pathway in mind need to ensure they have the necessary prerequisites at Level 1 to pursue those subjects at Level 2 and 3.

Recently we had our new entrants' evening for Year 6 and Year 8 students for 2018. I would like to thank all parents who attended and I think their feedback is imperative. It was lovely to hear how impressed they were with our senior students who acted as guides and the width and breadth of the curriculum that they saw in action.

The Aims Games teams, four in total, are working hard at fundraising and I hope you will assist them with their endeavours next term.

The Aims Games are for Year 7 and 8 students and it truly is wonderful that there are four teams competing.

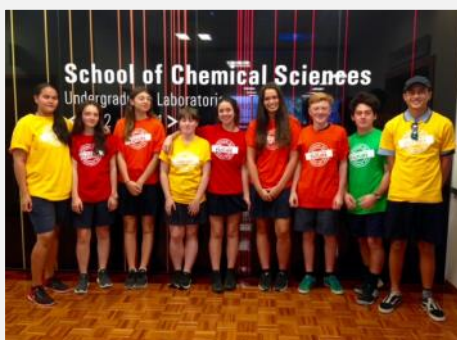
Maria Heer, Teacher Viticulture and Sea Sports

**Financial Assistance for NCEA Exam Fee
(\$76.70 per candidate)**

Who can apply for financial assistance?

Financial assistance is available to assist with the payment of entry fees for National Secondary School qualifications. To be eligible to apply you must be the fee payer and meet at least one of the following criteria:

- ◆ Be receiving a Work and Income or Study Link benefit (**benefit based application**)
- ◆ Have a joint family income that would entitle you to receive a Community Services Card (**income based application**)
- ◆ Be a fee payer with two or more children who are candidates, irrespective of family income (**multiple candidate applications**), where the total fees you would have to pay would otherwise be more than the \$200 multiple candidate maximum

Application forms are available at the school office. It only takes 2-3 minutes to complete so bring in your Community Services card as soon as possible so that we can reduce your fee to only \$20.00. **NZQA fees must be paid by 25th August.**

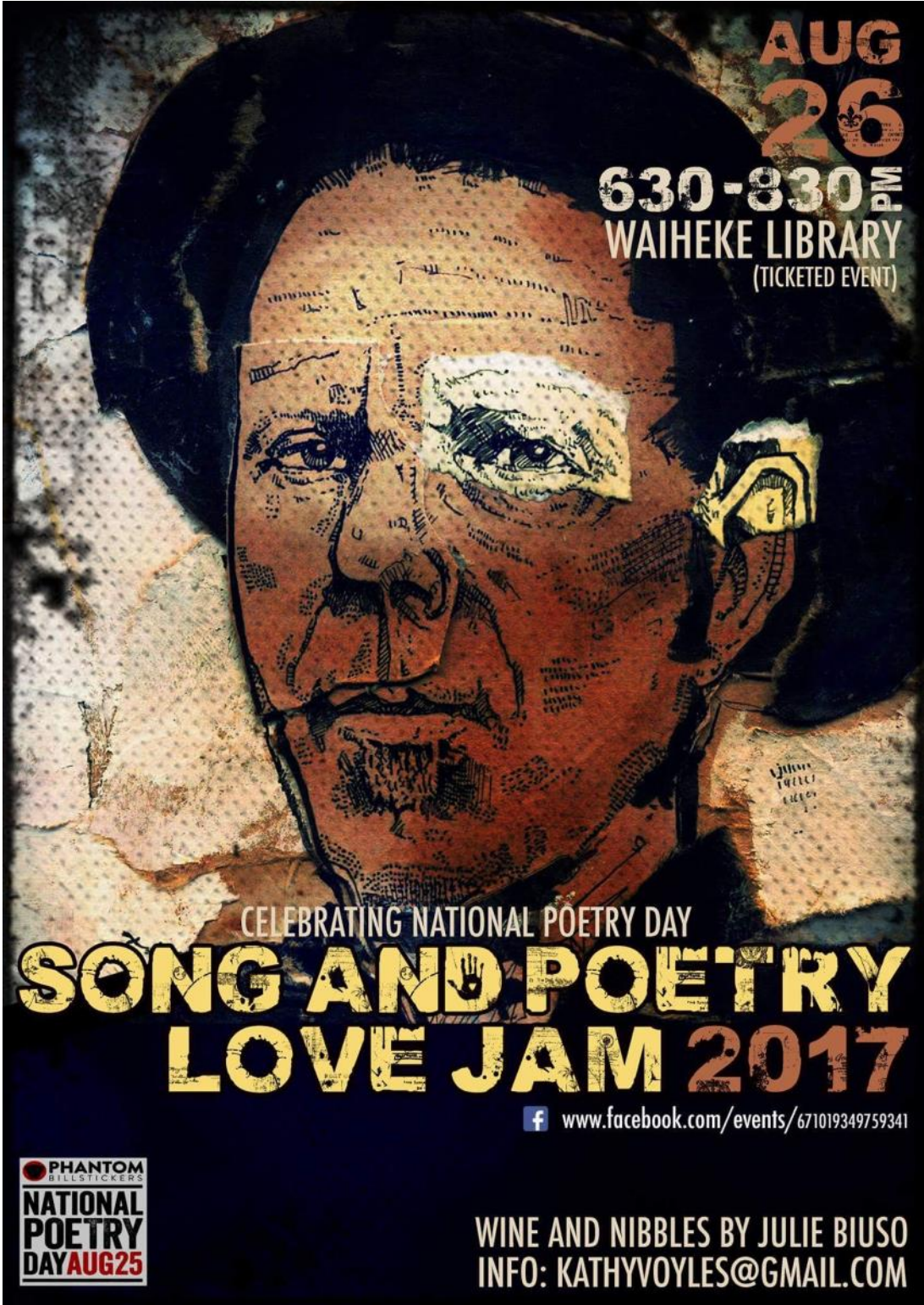
