Careers EXPO & Senior Parent Teacher Interviews July 4th 2019



Waiheke High School Year 7 - 9 Student - Parent - Teacher Night


On Tuesday 25th June 2019, Waiheke High School will be open for student, parent, teacher interviews for students in Years 7 - 9.

Piringākau Trip to Hawaii April 2020

A group of senior Piringākau students, teachers and whānau are going on a cultural exploration of the Hawaiian culture and compare our cultural experiences in maintaining our language, culture and a place in the world. On this cultural experience, the students will share music, dance and language with the High School we will be working with. We wish to inspire our young rangatahi to aim high in life and grow their te ao Māori identity as a global citizen.

Each person must pay \$2,500 each for a 10day trip to Hawaii which includes flights, accommodations, meals, activities and transportation. We are fundraising to subsidise the traveling groups total cost.

The itinerary is centred around building a connection with a local school, billeting students with local whānau, visiting the Polynesian Cultural Centre, Pearl Harbour and touring the island.

From the Science Department

2019 Youth Leaders Programme



In the Term 2 holidays, Rebecca Campbell and I had the privilege of attending the Sustainable Schools Young Leaders programme, during the Term One holidays. The programme went for thirty hours over three days at different locations across Auckland, with the goal of educating and empowering youth, while encouraging us to take local action.

On the first day there was a focus on tikanga Māori, learning about the importance and significance of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and finishing up the day with conservation efforts at Otuataua Stonefields. On the second day an emphasis was placed on marine conservation, with a

4½ hour whale and dolphin cruise around the Hauraki Gulf and a workshop on stream restoration. On the final day, Rebecca and I created an action plan to carry out at a local scale. This involved creating a sustainability group within our school and the possibility of helping the community to restore Little Oneroa stream. We presented our action plan to a group of around 40 conservationists working in different positions in the field of Sustainability, all over Tamaki Makaurau. We created many connections with adults and students alike with the same passion as us. Since completing the programme, we have achieved our goal of creating our Sustainability Group at Waiheke High School and have connected with countless members of the community who share a love for the environment.

The Sustainable Schools Young Leaders programme was such an amazing experience, and I highly recommend it to anyone who gets the opportunity to apply.

Wildlife Conservation Trip to Kennedy Reserve





On Tuesday the 11th June, Waiheke High School's Sustainability Group, which consists of passionate student conservationists, had the opportunity to go to Kennedy Reserve. We met Sally Horwood, an experienced pest controller who coordinates Waiheke Ratbusters and is involved with the Te Korowai O Waiheke (Predator Free Waiheke) project. Sally showed us the tracking and trapping lines set up and maintained by Paul the trapper in Kennedy Reserve. We scored three rats and re-

baited two tracking tunnels. We learnt about re-trapping and the dangers of introduced pests: the impact they have on endemic wildlife is severe.

One of the most interesting things we learnt was about stoat trapping: each stoat box might only catch one stoat every year or so, due to the cautious nature and intelligence of the animal. But it will catch lots of rats and hedgehogs.

This is not a job for the squeamish!

You can help with the Te Korowai O Waiheke project. Even setting up a simple trap in your backyard can add a patch to the quilt of Waiheke's War on Stoats. For more information you can go to:

(NB:- Waiheke may not have a very large stoat population but because they are such wide ranging and intelligent predators, just one stoat can have major effects on our native species. Waiheke trappers have caught about half a dozen stoats this year. Because stoats are so damaging they are the first on the list to be removed from the island by Te Korowai o Waiheke.)

Wetland Planting, Hooks Lane



Blessed with perfect planting conditions on Wednesday, 19th June, students from Waiheke High School planted 100 trees and shrubs, weeded and spread compost under the fruit trees in the Hook's Lane Reserve. The winter sun dappled through the trees as the students dug into the earth. They added compost and planted the trees, shrubs and ferns that had been donated and organised by Tony.

Tony King-Turner from Oasis Landscaping has dedicated 12 years to the rejuvenation of this wetland. He has coordinated with Council and the High School each year to help transform the area. Gone are the cutty Pampas grasses, Wild ginger, and other noxious weeds.

Raupo flourishes in the soggy hollow allowing the water runoff from the main road and Surfdale valley to be filtered as the water streams out to the sea at the eastern end of Surfdale beach. The bay is recovering its integrity, seagrass has returned to the bay and shellfish are evident again.

The students and teachers involved enjoyed the opportunity to contribute to the island's natural heritage. Many students saying they love doing this kind of science. Their enthusiasm was heart warming and made me proud of our students results.

As our national competitions usually happen at the end of one school year and the beginning of the next, it is easy to overlook these achievements, but it is important


to recognize the hard work and determination of these students who have been working most of a year in preparation for these events.
