Robotics Club

Respectable showing for Senior Robotics Team at Nationals



Mailis Herren, Toby Ryder and Ben Elwood, made up the senior team which represented the Waiheke High School Robotics Club for the first time at the annual national Vex Robotics Challenge,



held this year at Pinehurst School in Albany on 23-25 February.

This year, 67 teams from around NZ came to the weekend event – organised by Kiwibots – to work with randomly-selected alliance teams against another partnership of teams to score points by

stacking cones up high and onto mobile goals. Moving the mobile goals into different scoring zones and blocking the other team from scoring was all part of the strategy.

The team has been working and refining for a good part of last year, transforming their basic "first-build" clawbot into a consistently reliable and creative performer. By attaching an extendable arm, *Gremlin*, their robot, was able to place a cone on the highest pole. Their cleverly simple goal lifter was quite a feat for a small robot, impressing the judges and worrying their opponents.

Toby and Mailis made up the drive team – practicing not only their driver skills, but also their coaching strategy at scrimmages last year. Ben was in charge of programming all the speed and actions into the controller as well as refining the code for the autonomous period – where the robot drives itself – which was difficult with limited opportunities for practice.

For most of the competition, the Waiheke High School team hovered around the middle of the rankings. Paired with some good alliance teams and working well together to score points, they saw their highest ranking at 19th position near the end of Day 1. *Gremlin's* smaller size meant better manoeuvrability in tight spaces but it couldn't ward off the larger defensive blockers which kept it from scoring. By the second day, teams changed their play to become more defensive, and frustratingly, the Waiheke team found themselves being blocked and unable to score points or partnered with struggling teams, which resulted in the final standing at 38th place from 67 teams across NZ.

From humble beginnings, we are very proud of what has been achieved and pleased to have finished with a very respectable result at our first national competition.

The next season for WHS Robotics Club will begin at the start of Term 2.
