GOAL ONE - ISLAND BASED

Waiheke High School is an inspiring island based school for tamariki, teachers, whānau and the community.

Tamariki:

- Are engaged in school wide opportunities that embrace the Waiheke WISE culture.

Staff:

- Will localise teaching programmes by providing learning and teaching opportunities in an island context.
- Inspire students to be active and give back to the Waiheke community.
- Grow connections with our local community.

Senior Leadership Team:

- Will grow connections with our school community.
- Will grow leadership opportunities for staff members across the school.
- Will role model the expected behaviours and expectations of the school community.

GOAL TWO - TREATY PARTNERS

Tamariki

- Are learning Te Ao Maori in our bicultural classrooms in Aotearoa/New Zealand.
- All learners have equitable opportunities.

Staff and SLT:

- Teachers grow their cultural competencies through Te Ao Maori programme (Kāhui Ako).
- Teachers develop Aotearoa/New Zealand content across the curriculum.
- Are implementing and developing the Teachers Council Six Professional Standards for Teachers.
- Are provide professional development opportunities to improve Te Reo Māori and Tikanga.

GOAL THREE - OPEN AND DIVERSE

Great Performers at Waiheke High School

Ako torowhānui and mahi tahi by 2024

Tamariki:

- a) Improve NCEA results from Years 11-13:
 - By 2024, at least 95% of Year 13 leavers at Waiheke High School (WHS) will have achieved a minimum qualification of NCEA Level 2 enabling them
 to access a variety of tertiary education or career pathways of their choice.
 - By 2024, at least 95% of Maori Year 13 leavers will have achieved a minimum qualification of NCEA Level 2 enabling them to access a variety of tertiary education or career pathways of their choice.
 - By 2024, at last 95% of Pasifika Year 13 leavers will have achieved a minimum qualification of NCEA level 2 enabling them to access a variety of tertiary education or careers pathways of their choice.
 - By 2024, at least 85% of those learners with an IEP or who have specialised assessment conditions and are in a full NCEA Level 2 programme will
 have a minimum qualification of Level 2 as a Year 13 leaver, enabling them to access a variety of tertiary education and career pathways of their
 choice.
 - By 2024, to embed effective targeted programmes for Years 9-13 to improve pass rates of numeracy and literacy Level (1-3) and University Entrance.
 - By 2024, to have in place the RAS (Review of Achievement Standards) Level 1 3 and the numeracy and literacy requirements from Year 9.
- b) Improve results from Years 7-10 by 2024:
 - By 2024, at least 90% of Year 9 and Year 10 students engaged in a full time learning programme at WHS will be achieving at a NQF level 4-6.
 - By 2024, at least 90% of Year 9 and 10 Maori students engaged in a full time programme at WHS will have achieved at a NQF level 4-6.
 - By 2024, at least 90% OF Year 9-10 Pasifika students engaged in a full time learning programme at WHS will have achieved at a NQF level 4-6.
 - By 2024, to develop and embed COL (Community of Learning 2017-2020) around diversity, special needs, transition and cultural competencies.

- By 2024, to develop, plan and implement a series of progression learning tasks and developing new reporting criteria for Years 7-9 (the PACT tool).
- c) By 2022, to develop a new strategic plan for tikanga and Te Reo devised to increase delivery of Te Reo across the curriculum and the growth of numbers taking Te Reo Maori from Years 9-13.

Staff:

- By 2024, all teaching staff at Waiheke High School will have completed the training, practice and pedagogy for NCEA Levels 1, 2 and 3.
- By 2023, all teaching staff at Waiheke High School will have completed the training practice and pedagogy around numeracy and literacy requirements across the curriculum.
- By 2022, all teaching staff at Waiheke High School will have completed the training of PACT/e-asTTle/PAT and how that relates to next steps for learners Years 7-9.
- By 2022, assessment and reporting will move to progression reporting Years 7-9.
- Waiheke High School will collaboratively work with Te Huruhi Primary and Waiheke Primary School around the RAS (Review of Achievement Standards)
 and a shared pedagogy and understanding around learning progressions.
- By 2022, developing teacher progressions in Te Reo, tikanga and Te Ao Maori.
- To continue to promote online/remote learning programmes for learning and teaching.
